- 7. OLD BUSINESS
  - a. ILS Aspen Discovery Plan Update

GF reported BG staff are continuing to work with Bywater to improve Aspen filters and search functions. One of the priorities is working out the delay that occurs when a patron makes an online payment for fines. Mark at Bywater is creating a spreadsheet for terms/phrases that need Spanish translation. However, any library wishing to have marc records translated will have to find a service that perform that function. Teresa (BG Cataloger) does try to get Spanish translations for descriptions of any Spanish titles that are added to the catalog when available. Spanish translations of all marc records would require the use of an outside service.

LM, SM, SP are all ready to make the switch to Aspen. GV is close, SLO and PR still have some minor work to do. SB does not want to make the switch until the Spanish translation has greatly improved. MH (SM) asked if there is a date for completion of the Spanish translation. GF (BG) stated that it is dependent on libraries completing the worksheet once it is supplied by Mark at Bywater. Currently, Aspen offers more Spanish translations than Polaris. CB (SLO) reported that SLO staff are looking at one more month of training and have reported that Aspen works well with Polaris. SLO staff is also working with BG staff and Bywater to improve searches and are planning to create

training videos. MW (SB) reported that the city of Santa Barbara is in the process of updating their website to include both English and Spanish translations and they want to wait until Aspen is fully translated. She also said that the library does not plan to make the transition to Aspen until they get their own instance of Koha; and they are starting the Koha installation process soon.

CB (SLO) asked where BG is at in the process of possibly going to KOHA. GF (BG) reported that a potential switch to KOHA is not feasible until the FY 2022-23. Black Gold continues to work with the developers of Aspen to bring it up to the standards required by our libraries. Moreover, the upcoming addition of Carpinteria as a jurisdiction and the need to thoroughly vet KOHA to ensure it meets the needs of the Cooperative all take priority at this point. A major change to the ILS needs to be given adequate time and attention to be successful and beneficial to our libraries.

#### 8. **NEW BUSINESS**

a. \*Unique ID Entry Standards - SLO

CB (SLO) stated the protocol is confusing, overly complicated, and rife with opportunity to get it wrong. Some of the entries have three x's, some have five...it is too confusing to keep track of and too easy to add/delete an x in clerical error. That creates problems later when running reports.

ACTION ITEM: Take back to ATS to possibly eliminate the generic X's and simplify the input data.

#### 9. BLACK GOLD OPERATIONS DIRECTOR REPORT

GF (BG) reported we are resubmitting a revised budget for the Plan of Service to reflect the additional CLSA funds.

RAS is looking at some different alternatives to the Overdrive magazine collection. Demos for Press Reader and Flipster are being scheduled. SLO and SB have expressed an interest in Press Reader. The cost to the Cooperative with a 44% discount is \$52,000 compared to the Overdrive cost of \$35,000. It is possible for libraries to contract with Press Reader on their own. It would require a side load with Aspen since it does not connect with an API like Overdrive. Cost to SLO is \$15,000 and SB at \$12,024.

Work is continuing to bring Cuyama and Los Alamos online with Cenic, hopefully by the end of the year. Five-year contract renewals are happening for Lompoc, Orcutt, Solvang, Eastside, Cambria and Nipomo.

Our current JPA needs to be updated to include Carpinteria. NB (SP) stated the JPA will need to be reviewed by a lawyer specializing in JPA's to ensure it meets our current needs.

ACTION ITEM: GF (BG) will contact our lawyers to setup an initial meeting and/or review to see what needs to be added or changed in the current document.

### California State Library, Library Development Services Cooperative System Report, September 10, 2021

\*Digital Learning Platforms for All California Public Libraries. Here is the message from Greg Lucas:

**Attention Library Directors:** 

In response to your input, the State Library is providing access for all local libraries to six digital platforms designed to help Californians and their communities recover from the pandemic.

There is no charge for the first year but these online resources are being paid for with one-time federal pandemic relief funds and, as a consequence, will require other sources of revenue to continue beyond the one year the State Library is paying for. If we do a good job in getting Californians to take advantage of what's being offered, it's more likely there'll be investments made to continue the platforms.

Nevertheless, making online tools like Coursera, GetSetUp, Learning Express, LinkedIn Learning, Northstar, and Skillshare universally available to Californians **NOW** will speed recovery from the pandemic by offering quick help in returning those unemployed or underemployed hit hardest by the pandemic to the workforce.

We know these unemployed or underemployed Californians are disproportionately women, people of color, young people (under age 25), and people with less than a bachelor's degree. The choice of platforms took this and other workforce development needs into account and was informed by the responses to the workforce survey sent to library directors in April.

Among other things, the platforms offer resources for workforce development and recovery, test prep, career change, small business startup, digital skill building, soft skills, certifications, and more.

A list of the platforms with more specifics about each is attached.

<u>Here is a registration form</u> to let us know which of these platforms you want, as well as which of them you may already have. Please register using the link by end of day, Sunday, September 19, 2021.

If you already subscribe to one or more of these platforms, and you choose to participate through this America Rescue Plan funded program, there will be credit or refund coming to you from the vendor, which will work with you directly.

An important aspect of this effort is getting Californians to know their libraries are providing these resources. The State Library will work with local libraries in expanding public awareness of these services and in conducting outreach to Californians particularly hard hit by the pandemic.

#### \*Infrastructure Funding for California Libraries

The budget signed by Gov. Newsom for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2021 contains the single largest investment California has ever made in local libraries. Chief among the investments is \$439 million in one-time funds to create an equity-focused grant program administered by the State Library to support life-safety and critical maintenance and facilities projects.

The Infrastructure Grant Program shall:

- Prioritize project requests submitted by local libraries located in high-poverty areas of the state. No grant amount shall exceed \$10 million.
- Prioritize grants for life-safety and other critical maintenance and infrastructure projects. The
  State Library may support more significant modernization and construction capital projects,
  other infrastructure projects, and device purchases only if funding remains after supporting lifesafety and other critical projects.
- Require a local library jurisdiction to match state funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis. The State
  Library may reduce the required match if the requesting local library jurisdiction can
  demonstrate it's financially unable to provide the necessary matching funds. Upon receipt and
  assessment of these requests, the California State Library may lower the matching requirement,
  as follows:
  - For each library with local operating income per capita (LIPC) of more than \$40, no reduction in local match is allowed.
  - For each library with an LIPC between \$40 and \$15.01, the local match may be reduced by half.
  - o For each library with an LIPC of \$15 or less, the local match may be eliminated.
  - (Visit our statistics page to <u>find the LIPC for California library jurisdictions</u>.)
- Spend available funds before June 30, 2024.
  - o This means that funds can be awarded through June 30, 2024.
  - Funds will need to be expended by awardees prior to June 30, 2026, due to data collection and reporting requirements.

The State Library is in the process of designing funding guidelines and eligibility criteria and is developing an application process. The goal is to open the application period and provide funds to libraries as soon as possible.

#### \*Funding opportunities through the California State Library

We have two open competitive grants, one for workforce development with a partnership with the Local Workforce Development Board and the second grant supports libraries in developing a community resource navigator program, called Community Connections. Those, and other opportunities, are listed on the <a href="grants-page">grants-page</a> of the California State Library website.

#### \*Community Connections

The California State Library is pleased to offer <u>Community Connections</u>, a Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funding opportunity for up to ten public libraries to provide resource navigation services to patrons. The purpose of this project is to eliminate barriers that prevent people from accessing vital community resources, particularly in the areas of housing, health, nutrition, employment, and education.

This program will help libraries build staff skills and knowledge about social care resources, as well as create or join a hub of local social service organizations. Collaborations with existing service providers will be an essential element of each successful project. By expanding their capacity to provide effective social service assistance, successful awardees will build resilience and improve the health and wellbeing of their communities.

All participating libraries will:

- Receive funds up to \$60,000
- Partner with at least two California-based organizations providing social services
- Receive training from the California State Library
- Engage with a cohort of library staff focused on developing skills, tools, and knowledge to best implement the project. The cohort will convene monthly to create a community of practice.

#### \*Library Workforce Partnership

<u>Library Workforce Partnership Initiative (LWPI)</u> is a Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funding opportunity for ten public libraries to partner with their local or regional workforce agency. By extending and enhancing their ability to support employment, libraries can establish a leadership role in their communities as California fights to recover from the effects of the pandemic.

Working with a cohort of ten libraries and their Local Workforce Development Boards (Local Boards), successful awardees will build staff skills and knowledge about workforce development and enhance workforce development in their communities. Local Boards in California will work with public libraries, and together they will promote employment, career development, and skill building for job seekers. The California State Library will help libraries connect with local workforce agencies to initiate partnerships.

All participating libraries will:

- Receive \$15,000
- Partner with a Local Board
- Receive training from the California State Library
- Engage with a cohort of library staff and workforce staff focused on developing skills related to workforce development. The cohort will convene monthly to collaborate and create a community of practice.

#### \*Career Online High School

From now until September 10, 2021, the matching requirement for COHS scholarships will be reduced. Libraries joining the Career Online High School program for the first time will be offered four no-cost scholarships for each scholarship they purchase. Libraries that already participate in COHS will receive three no-cost scholarships for each seat they purchase.
